In the US, the annual perpatient cost of insulin has increased from \$231 to \$736 in the last ten years.

In Syria, up to 77% of income can be spent on diabetes supplies.

In Brazil, diabetes supplies can be as much as \$700 a month.

In Mozambique, the life expectancy of a child with Type 1 diabetes in rural areas is less than eight months.

Life with diabetes is complicated. Access to insulin, diabetes supplies and medical care should not be.

As a charity founded and led by people with diabetes, we're here to change that.

# A century after its discovery, only half of the people who need insulin have reliable access to it.

Around the world today, people with type 1 diabetes are dying because they lack insulin, supplies, education, and treatment. It's a scandal that disproportionately affects the world's most vulnerable, who struggle to access this life saving medication. The numbers are daunting, globally 100 million people need insulin, yet half can't reliably access it because its unavailable, unaffordable, or both.

And by never accepting money from the pharmaceutical industry, we can boldly challenge their global influence, fighting to make sure insulin belongs to the world, like its discoverers intended.

## Making a difference The impact of your support

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we've been able to strengthen our global network of advocates and campaigners and maintain our independence.

This has enabled us to make great progress in reducing costs and barriers to access. Like in Panama, where advocates signed an agreement with the health minister to ease the importation of donated insulin, glucagon, and other supplies. Or how, last year, through robust data and powerful patient advocacy, we built on our past wins and convinced the WHO to add disposable pens and reusable pens with cartridges for human and long-acting insulin to their Essential Medicines List, a decision that paves the way for short-acting insulin analogues to be added to the WHO EML in 2025. This takes us a step closer to the day when insulin, supplies and treatment are affordable and accessible for everyone, no matter where they are in the world.

But despite all the progress we have made, there's still much to do. Over the next three years we need to invest further in training and resources, monitoring and evaluation, as well as sustain our small UK team.
